About us

Mission East was founded in 1991 as a Danish international relief and development organisation. We work in Eastern Europe and Asia: both in high profile crises – such as Afghanistan – and in other more forgotten places of need.

In 2010 we worked in Armenia, Afghanistan, Romania, Nepal, Tajikistan and Pakistan, either with direct interventions or in partnership with local organisations. We worked with vulnerable communities through projects delivering a range of assistance: clean drinking water, improved livelihood resources, better food security, inclusion opportunities for people with disabilities, latrines, access roads, natural disaster preparedness skills.

Mission East is an organisation with a Christian basis and aims to demonstrate our 'values in action'. We are supported in our work by a range of institutional and governmental donors, as well as a private supporter base which is mainly Danish.

Our Mission Statement

Mission East is a Danish relief and development organisation, which works to help vulnerable populations, supporting communities' capacities to organise and assist themselves, through activities ranging from disaster relief to development assistance.

Our 'Values in Action' are: honesty, integrity, compassion, valuing the individual, respect for all people.

As well as direct implementation, Mission East works with and through local and international partners in order to enhance the relevance, impact and sustainability of its programmes.

Building up local capacity



Key achievements in 2010

- 15 water schemes completed, 30 underway
- 5 wells constructed/rehabilitated
- 1,300 latrines constructed, 600 underway
- About 10,500 men, women and children educated in good hygiene practices
- 9 km of rural road completed, benefiting approximately 14,000 people
- Vegetable gardening and training in storage and processing provided to 2,800 households
- Beehives and training in honey production provided to 130 households
- More than 400 households received training and inputs in poultry farming
- 17 Self Help Groups established with 15-20 female members each
- 5,280 local farmers received trainings in improved agricultural techniques and practices

The year 2010 continued to be an unsettled one for Afghanistan and all the actors involved in its reconstruction and development. However there were some encouraging figures with a reduction in infant and under-5 mortality rates, higher enrolment for primary schools, better access to clean water and 8.5 percent GDP growth expected for 2011. Above average precipitation during the 2010-2011 winter promises good harvests. Nevertheless the security situation continues to deteriorate restricting humanitarian space and access to vulnerable communities and many challenges remain. Life expectancy remains at only 43 years with only 27 percent of Afghans having access to safe drinking water and 5 percent to adequate sanitation. Only 37.6 percent of the young adult population (aged 15-24) is literate.

Active in Afghanistan since 2001, Mission East has over the years developed strong sectoral expertise, especially in the water, sanitation and hygiene sector, and is often called upon by local authorities and communities to improve access to adequate water and sanitation. In 2010 Mission East was active in more than 40 remote rural communities in Badakhshan and Takhar. We continue to explore ways for farmers to increase their non-farm/agricultural incomes and to tackle the high rates of malnourishment and food insecurity, often

arising from unsustainable agricultural practices on low-yielding rain-fed land and poor access to markets.

Stabilising and promoting rural livelihoods in post-crisis situations involves close collaboration with Community Development Committees, farmers' cooperatives, producer groups and women's Self Help Groups, providing alternative home-based livelihood opportunities for women and contributing to improved household consumption and dietary diversity. Mission East is increasingly working to build up the capacity of local civil society organisations and local governance structures to ensure greater ownership, self-reliance and sustainability.

In 2011 Mission East will continue in its efforts to provide clean water, sanitation and hygiene education to communities in Takhar and Badakhshan, and to create better linkages between rural producer groups and farmers' cooperatives, and local markets and the private sector in order to reduce vulnerability to food and livelihood insecurity. The strengthening of community-led disaster mitigation and preparedness capacities to respond to recurrent natural disasters such as floods will continue to be a key objective.

Focusing on the marginalised

In 2010, Armenians witnessed the sharpest increase in prices of food and commodities in a decade. This unprecedented inflation led to widespread unemployment and poverty. Thousands of young people and skilled workers left the country while a significant portion of the remaining population largely depends on remittances of emigrant workers.

The second phase of “A Healthy Start” project was implemented in Tavush and Gegharkunik regions. The project aims to change social attitudes and health care practices towards greater inclusiveness for children with disabilities and giving voice to people with disabilities. Advocacy campaigns achieved awareness and recognition of inclusion on community, regional and national levels of government and civil society. A disability surveillance system was established focusing on prevention, on-going identification and rehabilitation of childhood disabilities.

In the third phase of the “Towards Education for All” programme we are working in close collaboration with both the National Institute of Education and State Pedagogical University to develop teacher training packages and reform university courses on inclusive education. The total number of inclusive schools in Armenia has now reached 82.

“Living Together, Learning Together” completed its second year of implementation.

50 schools in Tavush region have been selected, students with special educational needs have been identified and teachers have been trained in Inclusive Education.

Mission East is also working with youth with learning difficulties to develop marketable skills through vocational education and training. Two classes for gardening and two classes for carpet weaving for a total of 87 students were opened. The class teachers have received training in Inclusive Education and undergo continuous supervision to implement the curricula.

Future plans include working with civil society towards strengthening of the disability rights movement in Armenia, especially focusing on vocational education training as well as reforming higher education institutions. We will also continue to strengthen the capacities of local partners to ensure that they become powerful organizations advocating the rights of the marginalized people.

People living with HIV/AIDS are another vulnerable group in Armenia. Through the Global Fund initiative, Mission East is working with 10 local organisations and a variety of government intuitions to provide support. More than 360,000 people received direct and indirect help through this programme.



Key achievements in 2010

- 1,450 children with and without disabilities and special needs were medically screened and received rehabilitation in Child Development and Rehabilitation Centres
- 1,902 children received a variety of social and health services in 23 Mainstream Family and Child Centres
- Over 1,000 special needs students received help in inclusive educational institutions and schools
- Over 1,500 parents of children with special needs received trainings and counselling
- 87 young persons with learning difficulties are enrolled in two vocational schools studying gardening and carpet weaving
- 154 professionals in the field of monitoring & evaluation, care and support, behaviour change communication and peer education trained,
- 369 adults and children living with HIV/AIDS received care and support services
- 126,488 young men and women received peer education on HIV/AIDS related issues

Radio messages (interviews, teachings, exchange of experiences etc.) about disaster risk reduction reach 82,000 people in mountain areas of the Karnali Zone.



Minimizing the impact of natural hazards



Key achievements in 2010

- 14 drinking water schemes for 5,000 people
- Multi use irrigation system for 2,300 farmers' households
- Farming training and inputs to 40 farmers' groups
- 12 food banks established for 260 vulnerable households
- Disaster management groups established and equipped in 10 communities
- 142 people with disabilities received assistive devices to facilitate project participation
- 82,000 people receive DRR messages via radio stations
- 38 children cared for in the Nepal Eternity Orphan Home
- 800 low-caste and vulnerable families assisted through income generation activities/saving credit groups

In 2010, mountainous districts in the Mid and Far West of the country continued to face severe food insecurity generated by successive droughts, crop losses, increases in the price of basic commodities and scarcity of food in local markets.

Mission East has started expanding from the remote mountainous districts of Humla and Mugu of the Karnali Zone, Mid West Region to new geographical areas, with the introduction of new themes such as Disaster Risk Reduction to minimize the impact of natural hazards in this region.

Local partners supported by Mission East in the Karnali Zone are KIRDARC (Karnali Integrated Rural Development and Research Centre) and the Nepali Red Cross Society.

Construction and rehabilitation of drinking water schemes are being extended to the district of Kalikot. Hygiene and health promotion activities have been reinforced, and the work to strengthen the capacity of Female Community Health Volunteers and Traditional Healers is starting to prove very fruitful.

The Disaster Risk Reduction project was concluded. This provided support to isolated communities to make them more resilient to natural disasters and supported the district authorities of Humla, Kalikot and

Dolpa in developing a pre-monsoon disaster preparedness plan.

Through the Food Security Initiative project, we have provided training and inputs to extremely vulnerable farmers for establishing household kitchen gardens, producing commercially viable spice crops, and sustainably cultivating and collecting Non Timber Forest Products. At the same time the project provided Vocational Training to youths who have no opportunity of earning a living through farming.

In South West Nepal, Mission East's local partner, Nepal Avinash Social Service Organisation (NASSO) continued to support the positive transformation of the lives of low-caste and vulnerable families in Rupandehi District and supporting vulnerable children in their education and care. It focussed on awareness programmes for hygiene (latrine construction, use and hand washing habits) – resulting in a clear improvement of hygienic conditions in the area – HIV/AIDS, women rights and nutrition, and training programmes in farming techniques, book keeping, leadership and women protection against family violence.

In 2011 Mission East will be exploring ways to further consolidate and expand our ongoing projects into an integrated approach to poverty reduction.

The struggle continues

Under the pressure of the global economic crisis the situation in Romania has not improved in 2010 and is in fact considered to be worse than 5 years ago. In a 2010 study, the country ranked in second last place among all EU countries for its economic performance and progress on structural reforms. An estimated 25 percent of the population still lives below the poverty line (33 percent of children). Government austerity measures have further exacerbated the situation for those already living in poverty, with tax increases and severe wage cuts.

Poor families, concentrated in rural areas, lack funds to pay basic bills, get healthcare or provide for the needs of their children. Elderly people survive on very low pensions (80 to 250 Euros per month). Many have lost their jobs, have been forced to give up homes or properties, and have drained their savings. Many have given up heating during winter as they are unable to pay their heating bills. While the state provides basic health insurance, Romanians must nevertheless pay numerous fees in order to receive basic medical services.

Suicide rates in Romania have increased significantly. Statistics show approximately 4,000 suicide deaths per year in Romania. In comparison, there are 3,000 deaths per year from car accidents. The number of children

who drop out of school has almost doubled, especially among children whose parents have gone abroad to find work.

Solia Speranței (“Messenger of Hope”), Mission East’s local partner in Cluj, Romania, continues to assist those who are affected most negatively during these difficult times: pensioners, single-parent families, people with disabilities and those suffering from chronic illness, who do not receive adequate attention from any state social services, lack any other support base and have nowhere else to turn. One particularly vulnerable group which Solia Speranței has worked with in the past year is those suffering from cancer and other serious chronic illness. In Cluj, despite the presence of numerous hospitals, it is very difficult to get a bed to receive care. Solia Speranței advocates on behalf of their beneficiaries from rural areas to help them access care and then provides follow-up visits and support to these patients in the long-term (often the only consistent support they receive in their time of need).

In 2010 Solia Speranței has further extended its support to poor populations in the Vaslui district of Eastern Romania, which it hopes to continue and expand in 2011.



Key achievements in 2010


- Monthly distribution of medicine, clothing, toiletries, school supplies and food to 13 single-parent families and 700 poor, elderly or chronically-ill individuals in Cluj, Bistrita, Bihor, and Vaslui Counties
- Medicine distributed in 4 areas of Romania through hospitals, churches and homeless shelters and free consultations for 250 people with no medical insurance
- 800 Christmas boxes delivered to families in need and children in hospital
- 11 families (60 people) provided with a social-support retreat in the mountains
- Initiation of a new project in deeply impoverished Vaslui district to provide clothing, shoes, medicine and food for children from impoverished families through a refectory

The support has been extended to poor populations in the Vaslui district, which will continue to be a part of the programme in 2011.





Preparing for natural disasters



Key achievements in 2010

- 58,000 children immunised against polio
- 700 children with disabilities have access to support services, including rehabilitative care, legal advice and parent's support networks
- 50 communities have established disaster management boards to evaluate risks and prepare for natural disasters, and 14 coalitions have been formed for joint advocacy and improved response
- 21 villages have access to water due to provision of over 80,373 meters of pipe to 241 tap stands
- 89 percent of farmers in 11 districts of the Kulyab Zone vaccinated their animals against Brucellosis
- 32 health providers and teachers trained on youth-friendly approaches to reproductive health, and 96 sessions held to help adults dialogue with youth

2010 was a difficult year in Tajikistan for many of the communities with whom Mission East works. Though overall the rains were not as devastating as in 2009, they nevertheless wreaked havoc for some particular northern communities which suffered mudflows more severe than any in the memorable past. This devastation, coupled with high food insecurity has meant a period of hardship for remote communities in the Zerafshan Valley where Mission East works. Food insecurity is an increasing problem for the entire country: brought on by ongoing drought, poor harvests, diminished remittances, and an inflation rate of 9.8 percent.

Mission East's Disaster Risk Reduction efforts in 2010 focussed on helping communities to enhance their capacity to prepare for natural disasters, using a new self-help approach which is already showing positive results. The coalitions of Village Disaster Management Boards formed within this programme are finding ways to pool resources and advocacy efforts. When a devastating mudflow struck Puthrin Village in August 2010, community members and neighbouring communities joined together to provide labour to clear the debris away from homes and roads, and bring emergency food, water, medicine and clothing for families in need.

In the Zerafshan Valley, Mission East's efforts also focussed on addressing public health concerns through providing improved water supply and sanitation for 21 communities: A programme which proved to have a tangible impact on reducing disease in participating communities.

In Khatlon Oblast, Mission East's disability programme has expanded to reach 700 children with disabilities with rehabilitative care and support services for their families, through improved mobile outreach. In the coming years we will continue to support the development of Tajik civil society initiatives to carry out locally-relevant advocacy efforts on behalf of people with disabilities. This, coupled with a new project in 2011 focussing on women's issues, represent Mission East's intention to develop civil society capacity in Tajikistan to work on behalf of some of the country's most vulnerable populations to give them a new voice and a new awareness of their rights.

In light of the current food insecurity, Mission East is also seeking new opportunities in 2011 to directly address the food security concerns of its partner communities: increasing their diversity of food sources, addressing nutrition issues, and opening up new income generation opportunities.



Mission East is responding to the devastating flood in Pakistan, focusing on food distribution and early recovery to the hard hit population in the Swat Valley.

A Disaster Shared

When disasters strike we want to be able to respond, but we know that we can reach more when we work together with other like-minded agencies.

Mission East belongs to two international networks, one global and one of European agencies, which provides us with the opportunity to respond quickly to large disasters. Being part of a larger group of NGOs is an important factor in today's world and plays an important role in the way we are able to meet the needs of those who find themselves living through a disaster.

The newly founded Joint Disaster Management Methods Project within the Integral Alliance enables us to cooperate and respond more effectively to disasters in over 80 countries of the world. Just weeks after the devastating earthquake struck Haiti in January 2010, Mission East had collected funds from Danish supporters which were being used by our partners in the Integral Alliance who were on-ground from day one.

Thanks to the EU CORD network, Mission East was able to respond to the devastating flooding which swept Pakistan in the summer of 2010. With funding received from member agencies we were able to run an emergency

food distribution and a subsequent project providing longer term livelihoods support.

As we look to the future, the importance of international partnerships is going to take on increased relevance. The risks are high that Nepal – with its propensity to earthquakes and flooding – could face a major natural disaster. This time, Mission East with our long presence, network and knowledge of the country would be in a position to respond – reacting just as quickly as our alliance partners who were on ground in Haiti when the earthquake struck.

At time of writing, we and our network partners are looking to see how we can respond together to the food crisis in North Korea. It is estimated by the World Food Programme that some six million of the most vulnerable people require food assistance. Together we make a difference.

Finances 2010

Mission East's income from private donations and public grants increased in 2010 and expenditure on projects increased in line with income. One-off charges lead to a financial loss in 2010 and a reduction in the level of reserves.

The increases in Mission East's income and project expenditure this year were in line with expectations. This positive development would have resulted in a positive net income. However, exceptional charges for the reduction of our accruals for bequests have reduced this to a loss. The outlook for 2011 remains good – with continued growth expected for both private and public income.

The information presented here is a summary of the information contained in the accounts of Mission East. This summary may not contain sufficient information to allow a full understanding of the financial affairs of Mission East. For further information the full accounts should be consulted. Copies can be obtained from Mission East's registered head office.

The annual accounts were approved by the auditor, PJ Revision ApS without reservation in May 2011. The accounts will be presented to the annual general assembly of Mission East, approved by the Board of Mission East and delivered to the Danish tax authorities.




Where did the money go?


Where did the money come from?




What was the money spent on?


